sacramental life

Baptism

To have a child baptized, you must register and attend a class as a couple (unless attendance just isn't possible, in which case some discussion with Kathy Kehnast will be necessary). Sessions are held quarterly for both parishes. Try to take the class before the child is born. If you are expecting, call Kathy to register for the class.

Please don't ask if you "have to go." This is an opportunity to meet with parents of children about the same age as your little one; those parents are in the same wonderful boat as you are.

At least one parent must be a practicing Catholic. Both godparents need to be practicing Catholics. If you don't attend Sunday Mass regularly (a major component of being a practicing Catholic), there is something you can do about it: Start coming to Sunday Mass.

Penance

The priest is available for Penance

- at St Bernadette Saturdays at 3 PM and Thursdays at 5:30 PM, and
- at St Mary Bremen on Sunday at 8 AM.

In addition to Advent and Lenten Penance Services, every Catholic priest is available whenever there is a need. There are Penance opportunities for parochial school children four times during the year so that they will learn the beauty of frequent confession. The Church's law requires us to receive the sacrament of Penance at least once a year.

Anointing and Care of the Sick

The Sick receive the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick when dangerously ill, facing major surgery, or suffering from the ravages of old age. We celebrate the sacrament communally at a Sunday Mass before Advent and during the Easter season so that we can all pray with you for "health of mind and body."

And, we are happy to bring Penance, Anointing, and Holy Communion to the homes or hospitals of the sick or shut in. It is very helpful to call the parish office to let us know before a hospitalization or when it has been too long since the sacraments were last available.

Holy Matrimony

Couples wishing to marry should contact the parish office six months before they wish to celebrate the sacrament. Why so long? Because this sacrament, not just the ceremony, requires serious preparation. And the Church needs to be involved in that preparation.

Remember, Catholics who marry outside the Church have left the sacramental life and need to change that situation before receiving the other

Saint Peter and Saint Paul

On Thursday's **feast of Saints Peter and Paul**, I usually focus on Saint Peter. I can't help it; I have some pretty good reasons for this bias, not the least of which is that I lived for four years in the seminary about a quarter of a mile from Saint Peter's tomb and his very great church in Rome. He was a saint I particularly liked because, in each of the gospels, there are unavoidable signs of Peter's flawed character, and yet we read that the Lord was willing to work with him and even to make something really great out of him. It adds to his fascination for me that the Lord chose this inadequate disciple to be the first of the apostles and the first pope.

But we shouldn't ignore the other apostle of Rome. Paul, like Peter, was martyred in Rome under the Emperor Nero. They have always represented for the Church two different strands in a united tradition.

Actually, nobody really knows anything about the actual date or year of **Paul's birth**, but we do know something of the **place**. Paul was from Tarsus in Cilicia. Tarsus was not in the Holy Land, but was north and a bit east of Syria, in the modern state of Turkey. Because his city had been given a special privilege by the emperor, Paul was **a Roman** citizen. But he was decidedly **a Jew**. He called himself "a Hebrew of the Hebrews." That meant he was a Jew who had learned his Torah and Talmud well and that he was deeply devoted to it. The first thing we ever hear of him is that he held the cloaks of (thus aided and abetted) those who stoned to death the first Christian martyr, the deacon Stephen. The next thing we hear is that he "was **breathing murderous threats** against the disciples of the Lord" as he headed to Damascus to see that the Christian "way" was nipped in the bud. It was on this trip that he had that famous **conversion** experience when the Lord stopped him in his tracks and asked him why he was persecuting him.

The last thing we hear about Saint Paul in the Scriptural record is that he had **arrived at Rome** and was living under a kind of house arrest there. This is an apt completion of the trajectory of his ministry as a Christian preacher in the generation or so between conversion and martyrdom. His life was **a movement** by the most Jewish of religious men **toward the most universal city** anyone could think of. Saint Luke, writing his Acts of the Apostles, wants us to understand that Paul took the Gospel to the heart of the world. And what followed on that was a spreading of the Gospel to the rest of the world. Rome is brought into the story as something much more than a passing geographical place name. By the will of Christ, something important happened there—and continues to happen to the whole Church through the Church at Rome.

Saint Peter went to Rome, too. Although there is nothing in the New Testament to indicate it so directly, there is an extremely old tradition that it is so. And, after some debate, a consensus of scholarly studies holds that Peter did indeed go to Rome, that he, too, preached the Gospel there, and that, like Paul, he died there **a martyr's death**. Peter and Paul didn't found the Church in Rome in the sense that they were the first bearers of the message, for there were already Christians in Rome—with what organization, we can only speculate, but with the Faith, we can be sure. What Peter and Paul brought to Rome was **the seal of an apostolic preaching**, especially commissioned by Christ. It was a unique witness to the Gospel by two of the men chosen by Christ to bear witness to him.

Uniting these two foundational men into one feast is a bit of a challenge. **They didn't always get along**, as we can read in Paul's report of how he "confronted Cephas to his face." "Cephas" is the Hebrew word for the name Jesus had called Simon; it means "Rock" and was very soon translated into the Greek word for rock which comes into English as "Peter". The issue was how Jewish a Gentile convert to Christianity would have to be: did he have to keep kosher dietary restrictions and follow the Talmud on the rule about circumcision? Just how divided the two men were on this thorny issue is not clear. One thing that is clear is that each of the two great founding fathers expressed a certain ambivalence on the working out of the teaching in some practical circumstances, but they were **firmly united on the fundamental point** that a Christian was not simply a Jew or a convert from Judaism who followed Jewish Law. In the final analysis, without repudiating the Old Testament or the Chosen People, they gave a joint (if sometimes uncomfortably united) witness to the message that in Jesus, something altogether new had happened, that in the person and the teaching of Jesus, in his death and resurrection, is found the pivotal moment in human history and in every individual life. Here, they proclaimed, is the great culmination of God's revelation to mankind.

There are saints and then there are saints. You knew that already. But **these two saints are so important in the history of our salvation** that the Church celebrates them solemnly even when their feast comes around on a Sunday. We put the Sunday observance aside for very few saints. These two very different men who were united in one message are indeed cause for joy. And thanksgiving.
